The Sermon by Timothy James Read Hebrews 4:16-16 and Mark 1:16-39

Being Clear

We are continuing the journey through Mark's gospel which we began last week. Mark's gospel was the first one to be written, so he was writing a book like nobody had made before (that's why the others are called "gospels", because of what Mark titled his). There were no rules - so how does he set about it?

He tells a story of what Jesus <u>did</u> and <u>said</u>, so that we can understand what that means. The first section, up to Chapter 8, is what we will cover between now and the beginning of Advent. His message was summarised in verses 14 and 15 of this chapter: "The time is fulfilled and the Kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news." Apart from that, there is surprisingly little about what he taught, just a few parables.

Instead, what Mark gives us is what Jesus <u>did</u>, and the pattern is set out clearly in this passage. Mark carefully selects what he tells us, and these verses set out five things which Jesus did.

- 1. He called people to follow him (vv.16-20). His mission, the bringing in of the Kingdom, needed action by more than himself. There is a role for his disciples, and that includes us. He calls us to work with him.
- 2. He conquered malevolent spiritual powers (vv.21-28). His Kingdom cannot be established without defeating the powers currently in control of the world. In due course, this would involve his breaking their power for ever, by his death on the cross, but the liberation of the man in the synagogue is a first step where Jesus walks in to the enemy's territory and exercises his authority. We can be certain

that the power to help us is greater than any other power which might harm us.

- 3. He healed diseases (vv.29-34). His Kingdom involved putting things back to the way they were when God created the world, and "it was very good" (Genesis 1). Again, this is not yet completely fulfilled, but it has begun, and Jesus' healing of many people, beginning with Simon's mother-in-law, is a sign of this. We can ask him to help us in all our infirmities, and to correct all the wrongs we meet, because he has come to set things right.
- 4. He prayed to his Father (vv.35-37). He was not doing everything by himself, nor was he trying to do something his Father could not or would not do. There is no division between the Creator and the Saviour. God is the saviour of the world he made, and he and his Son work together to put everything right. We have all the power of the maker of the world at our side when we go out to do our part in the bringing in of the Kingdom.
- 5. He went about proclaiming the coming Kingdom, because that was why he had come (v.38). The message has to be proclaimed. This is the most important part of the mission in which he has called us to share. We need to be constantly spreading the good news, and calling people to repentance and belief.

There is much more in Mark's account of Jesus, as we shall see, but even in this first chapter we are beginning to see the pattern, and learning not only what Jesus did, but important clues as to the most important thing of all, who he is.
